


KS3 Geography Fieldtrip Pulborough Brooks Educational Visit Plan










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SOUTH DOWNS NATIONAL PARK

Visit Introduction

This education visit plan has been developed to encourage schools to access the South Downs National Park and its resources using sustainable transport in the form of the railway.

The learning provider for this EVP is the RSPB Education Team at Pulborough Brooks, and the visit using the train was trialled by St Philip Howard Catholic School, Barnham.

Set in the beautiful Arun Valley (within the South Downs National Park), Pulborough Brooks is a restored wetland site boasting a great variety of habitats including woodland, grassland, hedgerows, heathland, scrub and ponds. The reserve is a haven for a wide range of wildlife throughout the year and is managed for the conservation of wintering wildfowl, breeding birds and other important wildlife, and you will almost certainly also see herds of deer and grazing cattle in the meadows.

The River Arun runs through the reserve and pupils can be taken right down to the riverside for a range of river studies, along with hands-on investigations of life in the ponds and ditches. There is so much to discover, making Pulborough Brooks ideal for children to explore and find out more about wildlife and nature.


There is a visitor centre with indoor space available for classes, a wildlife garden and wildflower meadow, and much more for you to explore!

There are a number of programmes for schools and each programme is designed to last two hours; sessions run from 10 am to 12 pm and then 12.30 to 2.30 pm. Two programmes can be combined to make a whole day visit which is what happened to create this pack, investigating a freshwater ditch and a woodland as part of the 'Location of Places and Environment' programme.

For this visit the RSPB Education Officer changed the format of the visit so that the school were met by RSPB staff and volunteers off the reserve on the footpath that leads to the reserve by the River Arun. This did involve more walking for the group but the time was spent familiarising themselves with the reserve and its location as well as using some map reading skills.







Level of risk (\mathbf{R}) is Likelihood (\mathbf{L}) multiplied by Severity (\mathbf{S}) and will be a number between 1 and 25. The grid below shows that 16 - 25 can be regarded as high risk, 9 - 15 as medium risk, and 1 - 8 as low risk.

There are restrictions on some tickets so you need to check the train times to see if they are outside the restrictions

Train Information

National Rail Enquiries is an excellent website that gives you live information about trains, tells you the next train you can take, the fastest train and helps you to plan your journey. There is also an 'app' which is very useful if you have a Smart phone.



Hints & tips

Let all of the passengers getting off the train go first, then get a seat as quickly as possible once you are in the carriage. Get pupils to sit in next to the windows so that other passengers can sit down more easily.

Most trains have toilets but this is not the case for all trains so make sure that you make your students aware of this before you travel. All stations will have toilet facilities but the opening times may vary at different stations. Pulborough Station does have toilet facilities but they are only open when the Ticket Office is open.

GroupSave offers a 34% discount on the adult fare for between 3 and 9 people when travelling together. plus children travel for just £2 (for journeys made wholly on the Southern network) and under 5's travel absolutely free.

Up to four children aged 5 to 15 years may travel Off-Peak for only £2 each when accompanied by an adult with a valid ticket.

Risk Management Plan

Each educational session or event requires an appropriate safety briefing. It is based on the risk assessment and forms the Risk Management Plan.

Pre-visit Briefing – delivered by the Group Leader prior to the visit to prepare the participants

This is a reminder of the key points to cover:

Emergency plan
Suitable attire and footwear
Weather appropriate protection
Emergency equipment, first aid (are permission slips needed for emergency medication?)
Food and toilets
How accompanying/supporting adults will be deployed
Expectations
No headphones

On Site Briefing – delivered by the Education Team on the day

Traffic

Outline of the day and emergency actions.

A member of the Education Team will be with the group all day, any problems should be brought up as soon as possible to allow for us to seek solutions.

Some of the site is a public space and the group is expected to be courteous and polite.

On the walk through to the Reserve there is a flowing river. As long as people are sensible and aware of their surroundings everyone will remain safe.

At no point in the visit should headphones be used.

Group leader responsibilities

In loco parentis shall remain the duty of school/youth group staff at all times during the visit. Discipline & conduct of educational groups will be the responsibility of the person in charge of the group, as will the responsibility for pastoral care. Officers who regularly come into contact with young people and vulnerable adults as a main aspect of their role have been vetted via the DBS service.

Details of the RSPB Child Protection statements are available on request.

Due to the nature of the environment it is essential that groups display appropriate behaviour at all times and it is within the discretion of the Pulborough Brooks Education Team to curtail the visit should poor behaviour prove hazardous to the individual, group or staff.

It is the responsibility of the Group Leader to ensure that the correct Local Authority supervision ratios are maintained by the school staff, and that the Local Authority is notified of the educational visit as appropriate. Learning Provider staff will be in addition to the minimum supervision ratios.

It is recommended that you take out insurance to cover risks of accident, illness, loss of personal belongings or cancellation.

Risk Assessment
