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Executive Summary

This report evaluates the Go Learn project delivered by the Sussex Community Rail Partnership and Southern Railway to Year 6 pupils on behalf of GTR Southern between April 2019 and March 2020.

The programme focuses on increasing confidence and skills for independent travel on public transport, particularly in rail travel, amongst young people.

The overall aim of the programme is to promote safety awareness and understanding of rail travel amongst young people. It has focused on providing young people with the skills to plan journeys, purchase tickets, and use rail services safely and confidently.

8,949 children have received Go Learn modules since April 2019. This has been from **222** schools across East and West Sussex. This includes:

7,264 pupils who attended Junior Citizen / Safety in Action sessions

1,247 pupils who participated in classroom workshops

438 pupils who attended station visits and/or train rides

The numbers set out by DfT to access the Go Learn programme have been achieved for a fifth year.

The feedback and evaluation results from the classroom workshops and station visits show that they are fulfilling the needs of the teachers and children.

End of Year Report 2019-2020

Background

This is now the fifth year of the Go Learn programme, started in August 2015, a partnership project between Sussex Community Rail Partnership and GTR Southern Railway.

GTR Southern Railway have a commitment to deliver Go Learn materials to at least 2,000 school children per year as part of their current franchise, and since Go Learn was implemented that target has more than been met.

The programme is not just about numbers but the quality of delivery with the aim of more Year 6 children accessing the three modules each year. In addition to this, the programme is trying to reach pupils not in mainstream school who have any form of disability or access needs.

Maddy Mills, the Education Officer, worked 17.5 hours per week from April 2019 – March 2020 developing the Go-Learn programme and promoting it to schools. However, during May – July 2019 Maddy worked, on average, 22 hours per week to meet the demand from the schools.

Progress Made

The Go Learn programme continues to grow both in numbers of pupils and the type of audience that is being reached by Go Learn.

Special Schools for pupils with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) are continuing to access the Go Learn programme and more of these schools are being encouraged to take part as it is important that all young people have access to safe and independent travel training. This year the Education Officer has noticed an increase in special schools requesting the Go Learn workshops, for example Springboard Education in Lancing, West Sussex and Cuckmere House School in East Sussex.

Safety in Action and Junior Citizen

These events continue to be popular with schools across Sussex. These events rely on the REOs to deliver the sessions. This year commitment of the REOs remains firm and they have been able to attend all the events. A huge 'thank you' must go to the individual REOs who run the sessions as they must do it in all weathers, and they repeat themselves many times a day, which is no easy feat!

Workshops

There have been 14 schools that have taken up the offer of workshops for the second year (and for some, a third time). There were 17 new schools working with the SCRCP. This is encouraging as we must be aware that schools will not always want to continue with the Go Learn programme for several reasons, including teachers moving on from schools so the contact is lost. Many of the new schools heard about the Go Learn workshops and station visits after attending the Junior Citizen and Safety in Action events. The Education Officer also attended the East Sussex Primary Curriculum Conferences in September and March, and the East Sussex Primary Heads Conference in November to raise awareness of the Go Learn programmes.

The workshops delivered from September 2019 were updated on an ongoing basis in response to feedback given during the workshops. Time continues to be an issue as there is a lot to cover in an hour and it is a balance between keeping the children busy, whilst not overloading them with too much information. Some schools are also not as organised as others and the session can often be less than an hour, which makes it difficult to cover all aspects of the workshop. In September a Go Learn review was held and it was decided that the sustainable travel part of the workshop should be removed to allow more time to focus on the pupils' questions about safety on the railway. During the September review it was also decided to cease the Poster Competition as it was felt the Education Officer's time was better spent on the delivery of the programmes rather than the judging and administration work involved with the Poster Competition.

Station Visits and Train Rides

438 pupils experienced a station visit this year (that's an increase of 195 pupils from last year). These station visits are a fantastic opportunity to consolidate all that they have learned with the Track safety training and the Rail Travel workshops.

Go Learn for Cubs

This module, developed by GTR staff who are involved with Scouting, has proved to be a great success. Well done to the GTR Scouting staff who have done a great job of producing this module and implementing it.

In addition to the modules that have been delivered as shown above, there have been some new initiatives for the Go Learn programme.

East Sussex Primary Careers Hub

In November the Education Officer met staff from the newly created East Sussex Primary Careers Hub. They have been funded to raise aspirations for primary age pupils by exposing pupils to career-related learning and employability skills in the curriculum; high-quality employer encounters with local businesses; inspirational STEM activities and engagement with parents. They were keen to promote careers within the travel industry. After attending a Go Learn workshop it was agreed that an extra 30-minute railway careers session would be added to the Go Learn workshop for the schools participating in the Hub project. An interactive PowerPoint was developed providing information about different jobs and the skills needed for these jobs. The Hub advertised the extended Go Learn workshop to their project schools. The following workshops have been delivered:



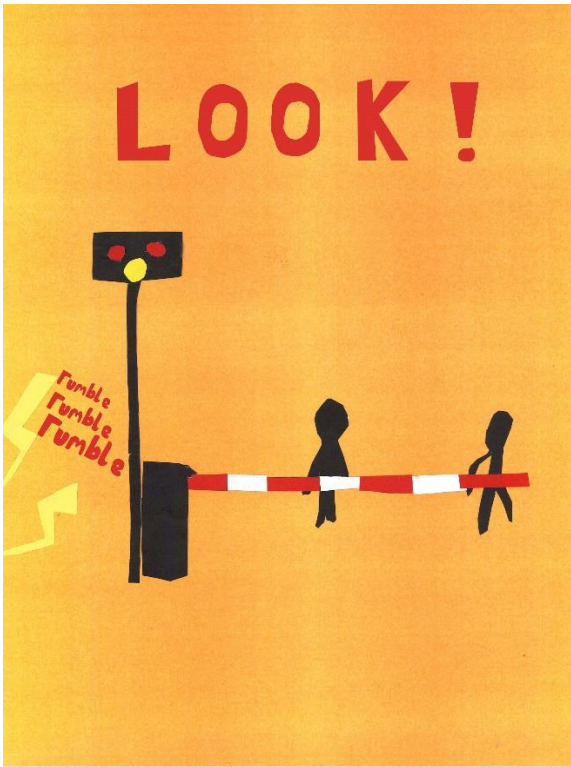

Rail Safety Project with Christ's Hospital School

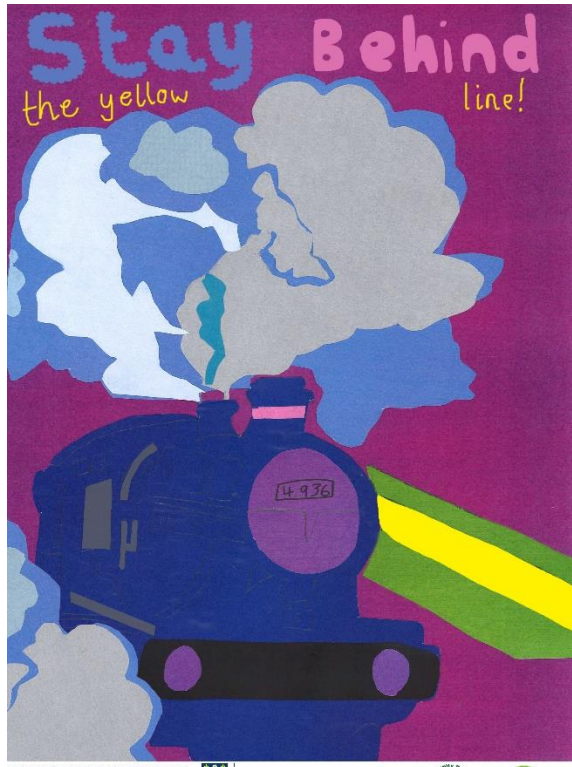
In December the Education Officer and Arun Valley Line Officer met with Christ's Hospital School to discuss a project on rail safety. It was decided that the School would host Year 5 pupils from local primary schools for a Go Learn workshop focussing on safety to be followed by a day in the School's Art Department. The workshop and art day took place in February 2020 for 18 x Year 5 pupils from five local schools. They created posters to promote rail safety which will be displayed on station platforms across the Arun Valley Line during Rail Safety Week in June 2020. The results of their work are shown below...

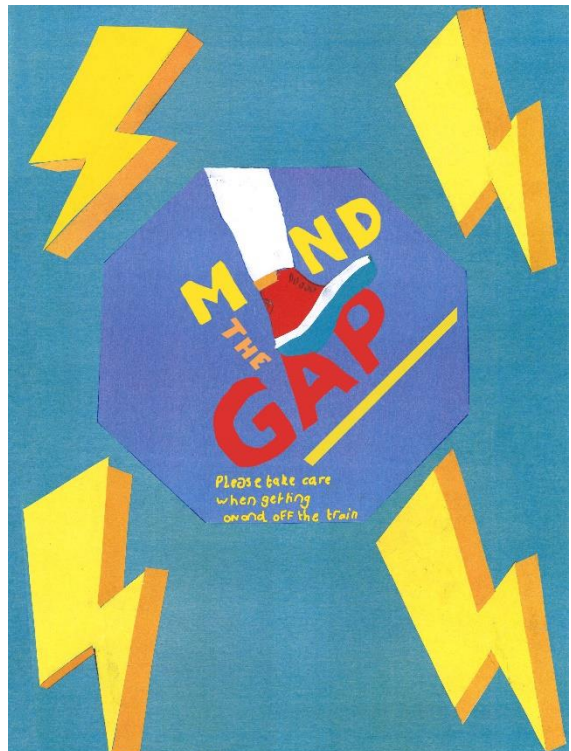

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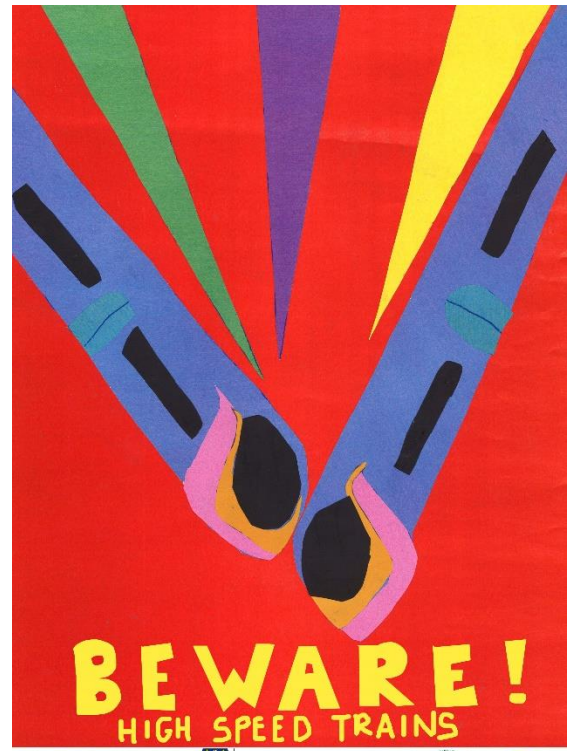

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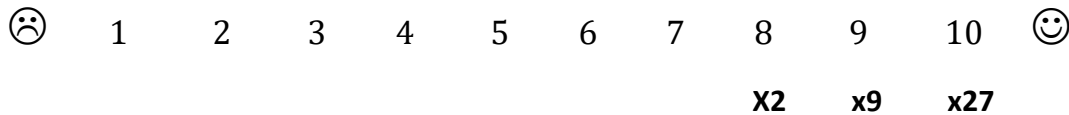

Evaluation information

Teachers' feedback for Go Learn workshops

Every class teacher was given a feedback form to complete and the results are below:

On a scale of 1 – 10 (1 = highly unlikely, 10 = very likely) how likely are you to recommend Go Learn programmes to another teacher?



What was the best part of the pupils' workshop?

- Real resources that can be taken away. Relevant content – Horsham station. Emergency button! What is an emergency?
- Actual activities with timetables! So valuable for maths / life skills etc. Journey planning. Rail safety
- Real 'hands on' examples and questions. Downloading app – very useful! Use of green button
- Reading timetables. Safety facts
- All aspects of this workshop were relevant and informative. It was particularly important for these children to understand the dangers of level crossings as there are a few located in the area
- Children practically using a timetable to plan journeys
- Great that the students had the chance to use the timetables
- The children were totally engaged and had lots of hands-on activities rather than too much listening. What they covered in an hour was seriously impressive!
- Interactive
- Timetables – answering questions from pupils. Reading train map
- Interaction with children. Handouts for everyone to use. Clearly presented. Good pace
- Very interactive, Maddy managed student behaviour well. Children were engaged. Children loved the resources being handed out – very useful
- That children used actual timetables to read (important skill). Links to Y6 Maths. Lots of activities to keep them engaged
- Teaching the children to read a timetable
- Safety (17) most important to keep us safe (didn't know about live rail being electric), timetable (5), jobs (7) now aware of jobs they could do in the future. [*Numbers in brackets are number of pupils who voted for that part as their best part of the workshop*]

- Children were engaged when identifying location using N/E/S/W. They were well informed on how to read a hard copy timetable. Many questions were invited to be asked. Stories and real situations
- Understanding rail timetables – how to use them
- Clear message, clear presentation, clear instructions. Practical
- Interactive, fast paced
- Resources given out. Very personable. Answered children's questions clearly. Very useful for life skills
- Timetables (hands-on)
- The Q&A with an expert – the children were so interested and engaged. All of it was great
- Information on what to do on the station platform. Safety on the railway platform and level crossings
- Timetable work was a good activity for life skills. The children enjoyed finding out about job prospects and salaries. Use of knowledge of compass / maps. Good balance of information and practical
- Interactive – children involved
- It was relatable. The children all use trains and Mrs Mills was very clear, so they understood how to read a train timetable. She used her own experiences to make it really relevant for them. They planned their own journeys. She showed them how to use the app
- Reading timetables – useful for children to learn for SATs. Safety at stations
- Map reading. Reading timetables – 24-hour clock
- Teaching the children how to use a written timetable was useful. Talking about how to keep safe on the railway: it was shocking to know what the children didn't know to begin with
- The practical aspect: lots of discussion and thought with a clearly knowledgeable presenter. The actual reading of the timetable activity was very effective and had the children's attention. Safety aspect was clear throughout and that it is not a joke!
- Variety of topics kept children alert
- How to plan a journey
- Reiterated messages given at Safety in Action. Discussed safety / practicalities of travel (problem-solving). Great that it was made relevant to children of this age (referenced secondary schools / SATs). Useful resources. Reading the timetable directly related to SATs past question – which train to get somewhere on time? Maddy asked about any children of note and then supported our SEND [*Special Educational Needs and Disabilities*]
- Interactive activities for the children
- Timetable activity. Moving around at the start
- Safety aspects. Knowledge of trains. Good to see paper timetable
- Use of timetables. Finding journey times – children enjoyed this activity. Real life activities and discussions
- Using a timetable, informative slides

- The whole workshop was thoroughly informative. If I had to choose a 'best part' it would be the children working out which train to catch from the timetables
- Practical use of maps / timetables. Straightforward approach
- Good resources – map and timetables. Good real-life context and skills. Dealt with lots of questions. Outlined clear expectations for safety
- Children using real timetables in preparation for their future rail travel
- Very informative – about an area of expertise that we don't teach / know about. Great knowledge for the children to have
- Very interactive – great that each child had a map / timetable. Safety section, especially making it relevant for this age group (mobile phones etc.)
- Using timetables and safety information.

How could the visit be improved?

- Perhaps more active things to do e.g. more use of timetables
- Maybe a harder challenge for the more able. Maybe get pupils up
- Moving around activity
- A video of a person using the train timetable and catching a train
- It was spot on
- Perhaps have a way to bring back children quickly e.g. clap 3 times, put hand up to show you are waiting. Let the class know what your 'sign' means at beginning of lesson
- N/A – it was great!
- Maybe news stories to illustrate dangers
- I'm glad that there was an out of seat activity. Maybe a few of those dotted throughout the lesson?
- The children loved looking at maps. It was really useful for the children to know about the danger of the railway track
- Photocopied timetable to use
- Not an improvement, but a longer session could have taken place as the children were engaged
- More work on the timetables to support the Yr5 maths curriculum
- N/A – it was brilliant, thank you!
- Smaller resources? (Less folding!). Ensure all timetables are the same version
- Could a demo of the app / website use be included alongside timetable (paper version)?
- Give children more thinking time
- Have some video clips and children suggest right action
- Possible demonstration of online journey planning. Good to share information but potential stories from children does not aid learning
- Maybe slightly longer with break – so many questions and all areas important, so unable to cut down content

- No, it was great!

Any other comments?

- Thank you! I am sure the children (and I!) feel much more prepared for our upcoming train journey
- Very well delivered, children all able to understand learning!
- Very well explained. Appropriate challenge
- We look forward to welcoming Maddy back!
- This was an excellent workshop. The children were engaged and learnt valuable information to allow them to develop their confidence and independence using the railway

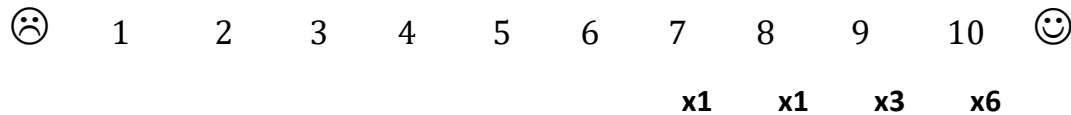

What was the best part of the pupils' visit?

- Visiting stations – going on the trains
- Really getting to know the station and increasing their awareness of it
- Doing an inspection, being on the train and having an opportunity to do the announcements
- Activities – short and engaging
- They enjoyed the inspection and sketching the most
- Ticket buying
- Train trip and sketching
- Going on the train and learning about how to get tickets and to learn further safety aspects. Doing the announcements and meeting the driver was fab!
- Travelling by train
- The actual travel on the train – a new experience for some – discussed safety and how to get tickets which is all so very important!
- Train ride, train ticket, inspection
- The opportunity to use ticket machine and experience travelling on the train
- Activities were shortened and children enjoyed the fast turnover / independence
- Using ticket machine, sketching and getting the train

How could this visit be improved?

- Longer
- More or longer activities
- N/A (Maddy could dress up too!!) 😊
- Speaking to other members of staff at the station
- The ticket activity was a bit short, maybe something more to it! Key questions!
- Stay longer, activities on train?
- More opportunity for children to meet a driver
- Slightly more challenging activities e.g. tickets – how much is it to...?
- See inside the driver's cab through the window
- Additional time
- Not so much on worksheets, more quizzes, speaking to station staff Q & A

Conclusion

The numbers set out by DfT to access the Go Learn programme have been achieved for a fifth year.

8,949 children have received Go Learn modules since April 2019. This has been from **222** schools across East and West Sussex. This includes:

- 7,264** pupils who attended Junior Citizen / Safety in Action sessions
- 1,247** pupils who participated in classroom workshops
- 438** pupils who attended station visits and/or train rides

This is a slight fluctuation in numbers from 2018-2019 which were as follows:

8,616 children have received Go Learn modules since April 2018. This has been from **180** schools across East and West Sussex. This includes:

- 6,704** pupils who attended Junior Citizen / Safety in Action sessions
- 1,669** pupils who participated in classroom workshops
- 243** pupils who attended station visits and/or train rides

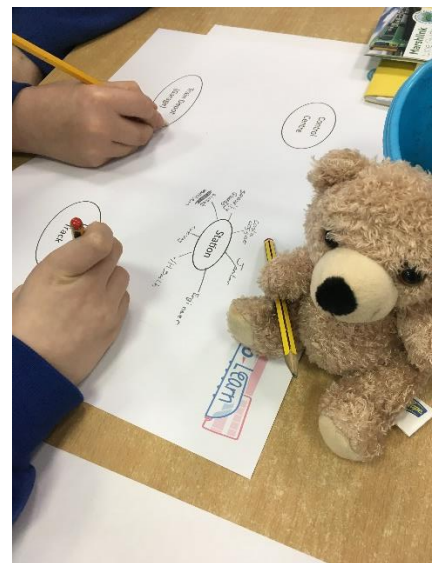
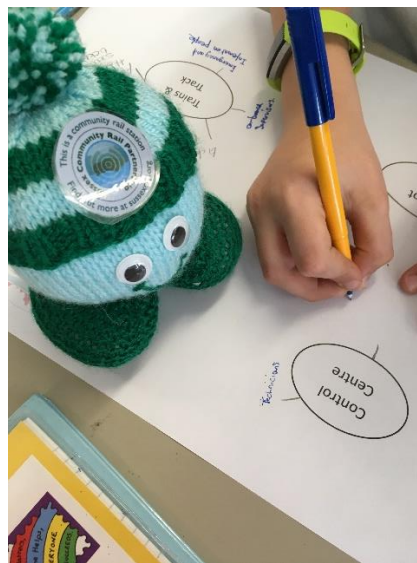
Fewer children and schools attended the Junior Citizen and Safety in Action events than the previous year as several of these events were cancelled in March 2020 due to the Coronavirus. More station visits were run which meant less time could be spent delivering classroom workshops.

Feedback from teachers and pupils confirmed that all of the modules were well received, and the classroom workshops and station visits were still fulfilling the needs of the teachers and children.

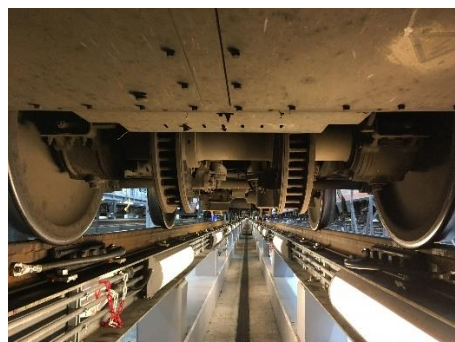
Lessons learnt

As a result of the Go Learn review in September, and the removal of the sustainable travel part of the workshop, the Education Officer has been able to spend more time answering pupils' questions about safety on the railways, including the use of level crossings. Many children were concerned about using level crossings, so the Education Officer spoke to a Network Rail level crossing expert to learn more about how they work to allay the fears of the pupils in future workshops.

Taking photographs of children is still difficult due to increased awareness of data protection and obtaining the permission of parents. To work around this the Education Officer has introduced a mascot (Flobble kindly on loan from the Arun Valley Line and now Ted) who will travel around with her visiting schools. The Education Officer, and several colleagues from the SCRP, visited the Siemens Traincare Facility at Three Bridges, Crawley in February. The Education Officer used this opportunity to learn more about how trains work and to find answers to questions regularly asked by Year 6 pupils. It also gave her an opportunity to photograph parts of the train that you cannot usually see. These photographs will be added to her PowerPoint used in the workshops. See photos below...
